The Ground Breaking & Blessing of the <u>Residences for Innovative Student Entrepreneurs (RISE) at the Charles</u> Atherton House was held on Thursday, January 13, 2022. This space will be an innovation and entrepreneurship center/student housing facility on the site of the former Atherton YMCA across University Avenue from UH's flagship campus. With a completion date goal of 2023, RISE will house an innovation center, incubator spaces, classrooms, offices, retail space, and dorms, making it an integrated live, learn, work, and innovation center.



Through their hard work and dedication, the <u>University</u> Laboratory School Varsity Girls Volleyball Team, and your coaches and supporting staff, for winning the 2021 New City Nissan Girls/HHSAA Division II Volleyball State Championship. The exhibition titled "Alfred Preis in Hawai'i: Vienna <u>Émigré, Architect and Advocate</u>" is on display at the Lane Gallery at Honolulu Hale through February 25, 2022. This exhibit celebrates the life and work of Alfred Preis who designed over 180 built projects and landmark buildings in Honolulu, including the entrance to the Honolulu Zoo and the USS Arizona Memorial at Pearl Harbor. He was the founding Executive Director of the State Foundation for the Culture and the Arts (1963 to 1980).

legislative highlights:

- Annual Budget: The Mayor will release his budget by March 2, 2022 and must be adopted by the City Council by June 15, 2022.
- <u>Bill 49(21):</u> To address the taxation of vacant residential properties and issues concerning the use of revenues realized from the taxation of those
- Bill 50(21): To expand the application of the ordinances relating to the disposal of weeds, garbage, trash, and waste from property.
- <u>Bill 41(21):</u> To better protect the City's residential neighborhoods and housing stock from the negative impacts of short-term rentals by providing a more comprehensive approach to the regulation of transient accommodations within the City.
- <u>Bill 48(21)</u>: Relating to Red Hill. The City Council finds that no underground storage tank or tank system that contains a large volume of petroleum product should be allowed to operate above a sole source aquifer on O'ahu unless it can be established that the tank will not release any regulated substance during its operating life.

Kamānele Park Cleanup



Neighborhood Watch



The St. Louis Heights Community Association also has an active Neighborhood Security Watch (SLHCA NSW) and have been working hard to keep a watchful eye on suspicious activity around the area.

Reporting your concerns

<u>Illegal Fireworks</u>

Aerial fireworks were banned statewide in 2000. The Star Advertiser reported that Gov. David Ige in 2019 signed into law Act 248, lowering the threshold of probable cause for an arrest to include statements from people who witness violations even though they are not law enforcement officers; and allowing photos, video or other recordings showing the commission of the offense authenticated by one or more witnesses. However illegal fireworks continue to be a concern as offenses are difficult to prove. Please continue to report these offenses to HPD and your councilmember.

<u>Private Property and Neighbor Relations</u> HPD, and the City as a whole, have limited jurisdiction over private property. However, if you report your concerns, we will try our best to find a good solution.

Noise

Call 911 to enforce Department of Health noise complaints. Include the time, place, type of noise, number of people involved, and the period of time of the violation.

<u>Traffic</u>

- Potholes: Report potholes through the Honolulu 311 app (this is not a phone number like 911) or go to https://www.honolulu.gov/dfm/poth ole.html. You can also view the scheduled road repaving on the Department of Design & Construction's website: www.honolulu.gov/ddc/.
- Speeding: If you have concerns about frequent speeding in your neighborhood, please contact your councilmember. When applicable, we will work with the Department of Transportations Services to conduct a traffic study.

<u>Homelessness</u>

Being homeless in public parks and on sidewalks is not a violation in itself. However, littering, restricting access on sidewalks, disturbing the peace, and alcohol and drug use in public areas are reportable illegal incidents. Report these violations by calling 911, and you may also contact your councilmember. When possible, include information such as the date, time, place, and description of persons and illegal activity. Also, the City's new CORE (Crisis, Outreach, Response and Engagement) Program launched its hotline: 808-768-2673.
